His many honours include a Fulbright Scholarship; a David Ross Research Fellowship; a Medical Research Council Post-Doctoral Scholarship; the Outstanding Alumnus Award of the School of Liberal Arts, Purdue University; a Killam Outstanding Teaching Award; a 50th Jubilee Medal from the Faculty of Medicine, and The Distinguished Service Award of the British Columbia Institute of Technology. He is a Fellow of the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences. He is immediate Past President, International

Association for Interprofessional Education and Collaborative Practice, and Faculty Advisor, National Health Sciences Student's Association of Canada. He is a member of the Boards of the Michener Institute, Toronto; the BC Health Education Foundation, the Women's Health Research Institute and British Columbia's Patient Quality Review Board. He is Project Lead, the Canadian Interprofessional Health Collaborative, funded by Health Canada. He serves on Health Canada's Health Education Policy Taskforce, and Committee on Entry to Practice Credentials. He is Co-Chair of the WHO Study Group on Interprofessional Education & Collaborative Practice. He is a member of the Editorial Boards of the Journal of Interprofessional Care, and the online Journal of Research in Interprofessional Education. John is a consultant in health education policy.



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
